How fitting that this year ,with hurricanes, high oil prices and not enough shelters for the displaced, that our theme is "unto the least of these". We maintain the food pantry and help center for Earlham. We ran nearly out by July, three months earlier then ever before. In talking to the heads of other area food pantries they are in the same fix. We are blessed because the school and the scouts both do food drives for us, our cord is strong. How are things in your area?

In New York City at the very beginning of the AIDS epidemic, two people, a model and a writer/producer started a group called Friend in Deed. It is open to any one suffering from a terminal illness. The volunteers walk beside the ill sharing the journey, going to doctor appointments, and to funeral homes to arrange burials what ever is needed. From the first two the group has grown to 80+ volunteers. Their cord is strong.

A.B.C. Quilts grew from the first two ladies quickly into a nation wide organization reaching around the world. Both of these organizations started almost 20 years ago by responding to a disease that most people did not even care about, because it was in the beginning only affecting gay men. They like some of the rest of the country did not think Jesus would want these men, women and babies to die alone and abandoned. They are the lepers of our day and every day the numbers grow in Africa and Asia. Countries where the government has ignored for too long the need for medicine, food and education. Friends missionaries serving in these countries need our support, our prayers, our voice in congress and our dollars. This cord must be kept strong by us.

In Des Moines the homeless numbers grow every day. Some times entire families, sometime veterans who served to protect us and were for ever damaged by that service, sadly some of them are teenagers thrown away by families who no longer assume responsibility for them. In 1998 two ladies joined together to keep these people warm. They formed My Brother's Keeper. Baby,child,twin and larger quilts are made, sleeping bags and pillows are made using old neckties to form the strap. Homeless veterans meet once a year at the foot of the capitol in Des Moines, and receive hot showers, haircuts, clothes,blankets and other necessities. To date 7,500 quilts have been made by these volunteers. They meet regularly on Mondays at Prairie City Christian Ministry Center from 9:30 AM to 2PM sharing a potluck. The second group meet on Monday's from1PM to 3PM at the Mitchellville Legion Hall. Everyone is welcome to come, for information call Leona Brandhof, 5182 W. 140 St So. If none of these ideas suit you or your group, then look around and see who is need of the love and comfort that comes from Jesus Christ and flows through us. If we do not allow the love to flow then we leave no space for Jesus to give us anything else, but when we use what he gives us then our capacity grows and we can be filled and used more and more. Everything starts with one idea and two willing to take a chance, Jesus brings the others to strengthen the cord. May the love and kindness's we do live long after our names are forgotten.

Friends Disaster Service

We want to thank you all for your patience over the last several months as we have been trying to get IYM FDS organized. Also, we are very grateful for your donations of goods and money for the hurricane victims and support of FDS.

We are now in the process of planning work trips to Wiggins, Mississippi, which is approximately 35 miles north of Gulfport. We leave on Sunday to Wiggins, work Monday thru Friday, and head home on Saturday. If you can only work part of the week, we will need to know that ahead of time so we schedule work accordingly. Also, if you are available for more than one week, please list all dates that you are available and we will include you into one of the weeks where there is a need. If you want to stay in Wiggins for more than one week, please let us know that also.

We are working with Jim and Sierra Secaur (from Ohio Yearly Meeting) who are heading up the overall FDS efforts in Wiggins. They set up FDS operations at a church in Wiggins on October 2nd, where we will be staying and eating our meals.

We will pull the FDS trailer to Wiggins on November 6th. and leave the trailer in Wiggins for an extended period of time. It will be available as long as IYM FDS volunteers are working in the gulf area. Each work crew will consist of 6 people (5 to help with construction and 1 to help with cooking). At this point in time, only one crew is needed per week. We will also be looking for a volunteer to coordinate the work efforts the weeks of November 27th and December 4th as we will not be able to be in Wiggins for these weeks. If you would be interested in this, please let us know.

Following items will be covered in more detail after we get the work teams set up:

- 1. What to bring
- 2. Arrangements for traveling with others
- 3. What tools to bring for your own use
- 4. How expenses will be handled for your trip

We still have openings for the weeks of November 27 and December 4. We will be looking for people to go after the first of the year also. The same schedule will be followed by leaving on Sunday and returning the following Saturday. We would probably not schedule any trips until 1-9-06.



IAYM's Missions Committee Project 2005

Last year one of IAYM's Missions Committee projects was to send shoe boxes for the missions in Chicago. This year we have been asked to assist the needy school children in Belize.

On November 20th the churches in IAYM have been asked to take up a special Thanksgiving offering to help with the education for children at a boys Friends mission school in Belize. Belize is a very poor country located south of Mexico along the Caribbean Sea. It is about the size of the state of Delaware.

Michael and Kay Cain along with Andy and Lisa Stout operate Friends Boys School in Belize City whose purpose is to prepare children to retake the entrance examination tests for admittance to high school, or to prepare them for learning an employable trade - and thus keep them off the street. Since nearly 60 percent of Belize's population is under the age of 19, the School plays a vital role helping to fill the gap between grade school, high school and work opportunities. There is space for approximately 40 boys at the school.

Under the British system, state and local custom regulations require all students to wear a uniform. These cost approximately \$11.00 for one uniform shirt. Many of the families are so poor that they own only one uniform and if it rains in the night the uniform does not dry, thus the student misses school.

Presently the missions school is using math books that were donated by New York Yearly Meeting nine years ago. These were used books when donated and over the years they have begun to come apart and we are now faced with a shortage of these vital books. Michael Cain has been looking for some three years now for a new supply of used books has not been successful, in the last three month he has found a new book that will meet the children's needs, these books cost \$30.00 each and the school should purchase at least 40 of them.

As fall is upon us and the school buses are once again on the streets of Boston, it's a clear sign that summer is coming to an end. So in honor of the annual homework assignment crossing the desks of many at this time of year I wanted to give my report about my adventures of the summer months.

I'm finishing up my seminary work here in Boston, MA, and as a part of my final class I spent 5 weeks this summer with Friends in Kenya. I had the joy of living at the Kakamega Friends Centre and Orphanage in Kakamega, Kenya. This place is a beautiful illustration of the love of Christ actively changing the lives of the least of these. Thirty-seven children between the ages of 6-13 have been chosen out of desperate situations and have found a home in this newly constructed building and in the hearts of the people serving them in Christ's name. The Kakamega Yearly Meeting USFW saw the need around them and began a feeding program for the children a few years ago, which has grown into an orphanage with a three story building consisting of a dormitory, multi-purpose cafeteria, classrooms and meeting rooms. This inspiring grassroots project is a visible demonstration of Christ's followers acting in His name and the effects of that work can be seen in the faces of these precious children.

My time with these kids was life changing. My concepts of ministry, my personal comfort level and my trust in the provision of my Father were all stretched and shaped. I spent my days attempting to learn Swahili, playing soccer and hide-n-seek, and helping with English and Bible homework. The kids presented me with a beautiful picture of the awesome and great God we serve and how mightily His hand works within His kingdom.

It was a memorable summer and I can't think of a more meaningful way to learn the lessons God had in store for me and serve in His name than with these kids halfway around the world. God is at work in Kenya and throughout His kingdom and to be a part of that is an exciting thing! Thank you all for your prayers and support, God is good and at work in the lives of His children all across the world.
