# FRIENDLY FLASHES

#### "But my name is honored by people of other nations from morning till night. All around the world they offer sweet incense and pure offerings in honor of my name. For my name is great among the nations." Malachi 1:11

I have been reading with great interest the updates from Maxine Nash about the fate of the C.P.T. hostages. I feel a mixture of fear for their safety and awe for their courage in living out their faith regardless of any danger or inconvenient to them or their families. The offering they bring is their lives.

Karen and Stan Bauer have lived out their commitment to peace and social concerns by the gifts of cattle given to start a herd and help better the lives in that area. Karen is in Africa now checking on the progress of the herd and of the mission to help widows and orphans. Unfortunate victims of AIDS while the United States has yet to honor the full commitment made to help fund the help that is so desperately needed. This plague is to easy to turn our back on until it affects us. The offering the Bauer's bring is compassion and practical help.

We have become a nation who helps only when it costs us very little and we have to only send money or someone else. There is a movie opening on the 20th of Jan. called "End of the Spear". This

movie should be seen by every Christian. We need to be reminded of what the Christians of 50 years ago were called to do. I was in high school when the opening events that lead to this film took place. I remember being sickened by the brutality that was meted out against those five young missionaries. The film tells the rest of the story. It tells how the families reacted to the deaths of their loved ones at the hands of the Auca Indians. Shortly after the deaths the wife of one victim and the sister of another went to live with the Auca. At the end of two years the homicide rate dropped 90% within the tribe. Mincaye the man who killed Nate Saint was asked if the tribe would help make this movie. After learning of the violence that is now devastating our culture he agreed. Mincaye says this "The foreigners are living as angry and violent as we once did. But they could be living well. We

changed. The foreigners can change too." After 50 years the peace and love those young men died to bring to the Auca is living and strong but it has been eroding away in America for the last 40 years.

What has happened to the outreach of our churches? We have become the silent majority, retreating into our homes and trying to keep the flood waters hate out of our homes. What would Jesus do? Became a wrist band, a bumper sticker instead of the call to action. Malachi was pointing out to the people that they had turned from God and their offerings were not honorable. Is our offering honorable or are we content to just keep the doors open and be faithful in our attendance only?

The greatest commandment is to "love the Lord our God with all our heart, and all our soul, AND love our Neighbor as ourselves" So how do we define love? This is how a group of 4-8 year olds define love.

"When someone loves you, the way they say your name is different. You just know that your name is safe in their mouth" Billy-age 4 "Love is what's in the room with you at Christmas if you stop opening presents and listen" Bobby-age 7.

"If you want to learn to love better, you should start with friend who you hate" Nikka-age 6.

## IAYM's Quarterly Mission Emphasis Mesquakie Friends Center

About twenty years ago Victor and Brenda White traveled from the Kickapoo Friends Church in Oklahoma to pioneer a church for the Mesquakie Indian Settlement in Tama. Victor and Brenda have remained faithful and steadfast regardless of frustrations and disappointments through the years.

There remains great opposition to the gospel in the Indian Settlement. Add in the racial barriers towards the Indian Settlement and vice versa and it has been a very difficult and demanding ministry for the Whites. A high percentage of youth from the Settlement also drop out of school. However, there has been much preparation in the soil of the people's hearts at the Settlement.

Attendance for children on Wednesday nights varies from 40-50 children with their van ministry. There are approximately 1000 people living in the Mesquakie Settlement that the Whites desire to reach with the gospel message.

Vacation Bible School was accomplished by combining their efforts with Fellowship Baptist Church in the community. It was held at the Mesquakie Friends Center. By working together, Victor and Brenda hope to form more cross-cultural ties in the community.

Another highlight was a missionary, who came to speak from the Rosebud Reserve in Red Elk, South Dakota. She spoke of the perils of casinos and of drugs. However, she explained the hardships of reservation life can be changed in your life if you have Jesus.

Visitors from the Friends United Meeting Triennial in Des Moines were also welcomed by the people from the Mesquakie Friends Center with their traditional dancing and a traditional meal. It has been a busy year but Victor states, "We enjoy it. We're glad the Lord has blessed us with so much activity."

There are several ways we can be of an encouragement to the ministry at Tama. Brenda's first desire is prayer support. Specific prayer requests are 1) receptive hearts to the gospel, 2) more commitment in people's lives as they are discipled to become leaders in the church, 3) more cross-cultural ties in the community 4) more workers to assist at the mission and 5) financial support to run the mission.

### A Word to You....from Ron Bryan FIRM TO THE END

Heb 3:6 But Christ was faithful as a Son over his own house; whose house we are, if we hold fast the confidence and the rejoicing of the hope firm to the end. MKJV

I have noticed a recurring theme in my life and it has affected my personal walk and my calling to serve the Lord as a pastor. Whether it is a pastor to a local congregation or as now, "pastor to the pastors" it remains the same. I believe we all need the reminders, sometimes gentle, sometime very forthright, that we must " hold fast the confidence and the rejoicing of the hope firm to the end".

There are so many different types of mountains and valleys in a lifetime and, I believe, also in the life cycle of a local Meeting.
