New Pension Law Allows Tax-Free IRA Distributions

I had intended to write an article about Charitable Trusts for this edition of The Iowa Friend. However, a new law was signed by President Bush in late August that impacts persons with IRA's who are 70½ years of age or older. The following may impact you if you are that age or may impact someone you care about.

Individuals now have the opportunity to give directly to charities from their Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA's) – without the hassle of paying income tax first – thanks to the new legislation.

The ability to make direct contributions to charities from an IRA is available for 2006 and 2007 tax years and applies to outright lifetime transfers only. In addition, IRA owners must be age 70½ or older to take advantage of the new law, and tax-free donations are capped at \$100,000 per year per donor.

Benefits for certain donors. Some of the benefits include:

- ·Individuals who don't or can't itemize their taxes in order to claim charitable gift deductions.
- ·Donors who have reached their charitable deduction limit.
- Donors living in states that don't allow charitable deductions.
- ·Most important Individuals may satisfy their required minimum distributions by gifting directly from the IRA to charity.

Don't focus on the \$100,000 maximum. Rather, focus on your individual situation. Are you using all of your required minimum distribution? If not, you may want to consider using that portion for your charitable gifts for 2006 and 2007. Or, if you have already gifted for 2006, just shift your thinking to 2007 and 2008 (but the gifts are done in 2006 and 2007). Maybe you are thinking about a charitable gift that is slightly larger in these two years.

Currently this only applies to calendar years 2006 and 2007. We think Congress is "testing the waters" to see how many persons may do these transfers with their IRA's.

Mennonite Foundation can help. If you are interested in learning more about this new legislation, or would like to make a charitable donation from your IRA, I can help you to incorporate this into your charitable giving plan. Remember, this will be an outright gift to your church or other chosen charitable organization in a direct way.

"I fear that we as Friends have left our first love. We have followed the world as defined by intellectuals rather than faith!"


What motivated our early leaders? Finding the Kingdom of God!
