# What is our FOCUS?

Some thoughts that I believe are very important to the direction of Iowa Yearly Meeting have been growing stronger in my spirit for the last two weeks, or since the Board on Coordination all committees retreat October 12-13. In the book, *Lead Like Jesus* by Ken Blanchard and Phil Hodges, on page 113 is an outline that explains where I believe we need to refocus our immediate energies. ".....remember that servant leadership involves:

Setting the purpose or vision

Communicating a compelling picture of the future

Defining and modeling the values, structure, and behavior you want from people

Creating an environment of empowerment

Moving to the bottom of the pyramid to support those who are responsible to serve Showing respect for everyone

Placing the growth and development of people on par with accomplishing the vision"

For everyone who may read this article, I would ask these questions:

What is IAYM's purpose or vision?

What is our compelling picture of the future?

Can we define or model our core values?

Do you feel like we are creating an environment of empowerment?

Are our leaders willing to move to the bottom to become the servers?

Do we show respect for everyone?

## What is our first priority for development of people?

Simply stated I have a strong sense that we, as a Christian Church denomination, would be hard pressed in this generation to define our core values, be able to state our vision clearly, or be able to state what our picture of the future actually is. Without a clear vision known by all, I fear that we have transitioned into an organization that works in and through each committee as its own separate entity. It is called working in a silo. Our committees do work and attempt to develop strategies for the good of their purpose; however, the unanswered question is how that fits with our overall vision and strategy does for the Yearly Meeting as a whole. Sometimes it is referred to, yes even yet today, **the BIG PICTURE.** 

I believe I have a developed understanding of what our core values are. I also believe I understand our vision statement, "Iowa Yearly Meeting-Spreading like Prairie Grass to Make the Love of Jesus Christ Known in the Heartland and Beyond". However, this statement was developed over fifteen years ago. Is it time to develop together a new unified vision for all to rally around and make a new compelling picture of our future? Can we reaffirm our core values in such a way that they inspire and motivate all the members in all of our churches?





# FUM Ministry of the Month

## **Turkana Friends Mission**

The ministry of Turkana Friends Mission (TFM) in the northwest corner of Kenya continues to grow. Originally established to care for orphans and to provide technical training and job skills to youth, the mission now includes 13 Friends' churches, three primary schools and six nursery schools. Every year TFM increases by two or three new churches within the region.

Although studies indicate girl-education is one of the most important factors in stemming the tide of poverty, girls in Turkana often drop out of school by the age of 12. TFM, through the generosity of FUM, has committed to provide a full high school scholarship to every Turkana girl in a Friends church or school who manages to pass her primary school exam. Since 2006, through the Girl Child Education Program, more than 40 girls have done so.

Two years ago, a group of Congolese refugees living within one of the largest refugee camps (Kakuma) requested assistance to establish a Friends church within their camp. Today Kakuma Refugee Camp Friends Church is a thriving multi-ethnic, multi-ethnic, multi-lingual ministry of refugees to refugees.

Southern Sudan is the worlds' newest country, bordering Turkana. John Moru, director of TFM and his wife, Grace, have sensed the Lord calling them to extend their work to this region. TFM is currently supporting this couple to make a series of exploratory visits enabling them to build relationships and discern where God would have them make the greatest impact.

God's presence is certainly transforming may lives through the mission of TFM and the generosity of FUM.

- May John and Grace Moru follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit in developing vital relationships in the communities of Southern Sudan.
- 2. May peace and healing continue to transform those who live in the Kakuma refugee camp.
- Praise God for the leadership and faithfulness of Kakuma Friends
   Church. May they continue to be guided by the spirit of wisdom especially in their relationships with their Muslim neighbors who are also inhabitants of the camp.
- 4. Praise God for the overwhelming success of the Girl Child Education Program. May all school girls in Turkana persevere in their educational efforts. May the girls' families, peers and communities encourage these girls to attain their God-given potential
- May there be a way for Friends to begin offering basic health care ministries in Turkana.
- May Turkanan Friends, both men and women, who are called into pastoral ministry and who are studying at Friends Theological College (FTC) be anointed and equipped to do the work to which God calls them
- 7. May there be increased financial support for TFM as the Lord leads the ministry to grow in its effectiveness.

# Remembering our Spiritual Trails 150th Anniversary of Iowa Yearly Meeting

This section is from the 100th yearbook of "Spiritual Trails" Part V

"Friends Work for Social Betterment and Peace"

Helping the Freedmen

Immediately following the Emancipation Proclamation intense suffering befell the freedmen, especially the elderly, the widows and children. Northern newspapers of that period printed many articles describing the dire circumstances of these needy freedmen of the South. Appeals were made for food, clothing, shoes, boots and money for their relief. The Freedmen's Committee of Mahaska County, lowa named a leader from each township in the county to direct an intensive drive for the above mentioned items.

True to form, Iowa Friends became concerned about the education of this needy group, both young and old. Consequently, during the first Iowa Yearly Meeting held in September of 1863, a committee on Improving the Conditions of the Freedmen of the South was appointed.

By 1865 David Morgan, General Agent appointed by the committee, had visited the Freedmen's Committees of Indiana and Ohio. As a result the Iowa Yearly Meeting Committee on Freedmen became a coordinate branch with Ohio, Indiana, and Western Yearly Meetings Freedmen's Boards. An early accomplishment of the committee was to open schools for colored children and adults in Indianola and Oskaloosa, Iowa.

By Yearly Meeting of 1886, Isaac T. Gibson, the General Agent, had opened schools in Weston, St. Joseph, Springfield, Sedalia, Columbia, and Mexico in Missouri and one in Atchison, Kansas with a total enrollment of 1,505 children and adults. That year the Yearly Meeting contributed \$2,381.62 with an additional \$2,499.61 coming from other sources.

In 1868 the General Agent, David Morgan, used his influence to get the Missouri law to support the Negro schools in that state which had increased in number again.

In 1869 the lowa Yearly Meeting Freedmen's Committee's General Agent supervised seven teachers and schools with over 1,000 pupils. As the years passed, support was received from Scotland and England as well as from our own Yearly Meeting. Also, the work spread from Missouri and Kansas into Mississippi and South Carolina. When the need arose, Friends held Normal Schools of three months duration at various places.

In 1880 the school at Sedalia, Missouri had 332 students and four colored teachers. D.W. Bowles served as head teacher there for eight years.

Land was purchased in Parsons, Kansas in 1881 on which a school building was constructed for \$2,000. Hobson Normal Institute was in operation by 1883 under the leadership of D.W. Bowles. The school grew to an enrollment of 88 by 1885 with 7 graduating that year. Hobson Normal Institute continued to guide the people of color both educationally and religiously until 1897 when the Iowa Yearly Meeting Committee on Freedmen decided to sell the property and give the proceeds to assist worthy Negro children attend Southland College.

During the 34 years of efforts to aid in the education of the colored people of the South, Iowa Friends gave freely of their money, possessions, and services as teachers. It is with deepest respect that we review these efforts to prepare the freedom for their rightful place in their world and surroundings.

# Winter Ideas to "Live Love"

Genuine love and compassion for God and others is what attracts people to the Gospel and thus to our church family.

This love must spill over from the walls of our churches and out into the community in significant ways if we are going to make any lasting impact. It seems people don't always remember what they are *told* of God's love, but they never forget what they have *experienced* of God's love. ~ *Conspiracy of Kindness* by Steve Sjogren

These suggestions can be done as a family, individual or with a small group. You might want to print a few in your church bulletin each week.

### December

Run an errand or cook a meal for someone who is extra stressed.

Ask everyone you meet "How are you, today?" or just say, "Hi, have a nice day!"

Have a family baking day, then take the cookies to people you haven't seen in a while.

Invite a senior citizen who doesn't have family living near to join you for holiday activities like decorating the house or baking goodies for Christmas.

Take a pizza to a hospital waiting room for anxious family members.

Look for opportunities to open the door or give up your seat for someone.

We encourage these suggestions to be a whole church challenge. Following are ideas to pick from and use during December, January & February.

- <u>Parents' Night Out</u>: Adults and youth volunteer to keep children at church while parents go out for an evening. This not only benefits parents but allows others to get to know children of the church better. Provide pizza, crafts, board games and a G-rated video.
- <u>For Random Acts, Create a card</u>: "While you were gone we fed your parking meter to show you God's love in a practical way. If there is more that we can help you with, please call us at \_\_\_\_\_(your church name & phone number)". Or change it to read that you left quarters in the grocery carts, change in the phone, or vender machine, etc.
- <u>Super Bowl Party</u>: Host a community party at church on February 3<sup>rd</sup> that is both kid and adult friendly. Ask everyone to bring cans of soup for your local food box or shelter and take a few minutes during half time for a representative to share about that ministry.
- Reach Out and Touch: Choose a month and those who want to participate submit their names. People are matched up secretly. Weekly during the month they anonymously connect with their secret pal. It could be as simple as a card and as extravagant as a delivered meal, restaurant gift card, or a 'movie-pack' (microwave popcorn, M & M's, and a DVD). At the end of the month all is revealed.
- <u>Game night for all ages</u>: Be sure to include multigenerational games. There is nothing like the younger ones getting together for fun with the older generation. A blessing to both. Provide drinks and have everyone bring their favorite snack to share.
- <u>Fruit Giveaway</u>: People really like fresh fruit, and they readily take it. Put an orange, an apple, and a banana in a bag with a connection card saying you are sharing the 'fruit of God's love'. Hand them out in a mall area or go door to door in your neighborhood.

If our faith in God doesn't cause us to do anything different in our lives, then our faith is not a living faith. Bring your faith to life by putting it into action!

If these spark other ideas that work for you and your church, let us know and we'll pass them on to encourage others. May you feel God's blessings as you strive to live God's love in your family and community.
