

Marilynne Robinson is a masterful storyteller and a writer that we can all relate to in our everyday lives. We are extremely fortunate to have her as our speaker for the USFW Spring Luncheon this April 6th at West Branch. This is one event you will not want to

miss and you will want to bring any friend along who loves great books.

Robinson has written three highly acclaimed novels: Housekeeping (1980), Gilead (2004) and Home (2008). Housekeeping was a finalist for the 1982 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction (US), Gilead was awarded the 2005 Pulitzer, and Home received the 2009 Orange Prize for Fiction (UK). Home is a companion to Gilead and focuses on the Boughton family during the same time period.

She is also the author of numerous non-fiction works. Robinson was raised as a Presbyterian and later became a Congregationalist, worshipping and sometimes preaching at the Congregational United Church of Christ in Iowa City. Her Congregationalism, and her interest in the ideas of John Calvin, have been important in her works, including *Gilead*, which centers on the life and theological concerns of a fictional Congregationalist minister.

What does being a missionary in Snoul look like? A year ago we were just getting our feet wet and weren't entirely sure ourselves! Now, God has rooted our hearts here so that it truly feels like home: our place, our people, our opportunity to be a part of God's blessing for the nations!

If we look with our physical eyes we see spirit and ancestor worship everywhere. Shrines and temples, incense and offerings, talk of good deeds for a better reincarnation and the monotonous chanting of monks surround us. However, when we look through eyes of faith, we clearly see God at work. We are blessed that the house church that seemed so fragile



last year now often surprises us with their passion for outreach and obedience to Jesus. A new believer has joined our group and is fighting to follow Jesus and turn away from his alcoholic past. God is moving in his life. People we had not met a year ago now sit with us to talk about the God who made the world and knows them by name, and we see God's hand at work.

God has also sustained us through the year our team leaders were away, and enabled us to carry on the work with 15 school teachers in remote villages and 5 libraries which provide resources on everything from planting cucumbers to healthy pregnancy. These projects help meet real needs and help us connect with people in areas where Christian influence is next to non-existent. What a privilege we have been given to be a part of this ministry.

Remembering our Spiritual Trails 150th Anniversary of Iowa Yearly Meeting

This section is from the 100th yearbook of "Spiritual Trails"

"Auxiliary Organizations—Evolve Through the Years" Christian Endeavor and Young Friends

The earliest youth work in Iowa Friends churches was done through the first day scripture schools. Complimentary to this organized spiritual enlightenment was the religious contribution of Friends schools boarding schools, academies and colleges.

During the era of the reawakening of Friends in the 1880's and 1890's there came a new vital means of organized ministry for youth. This was the introduction of Christian Endeavor. In the report of the Home and Foreign Missionary Board of Iowa Yearly Meeting to the 1891 sessions the following communication is recorded: "The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor have had much to do in this great awakening of missionary interest. Their pledge of \$400 to support a worker in the field the coming year, is most thankfully accepted. We praise the Lord for the outpouring of this spirit upon us."

In 1892 the Yearly Meeting began to publish for the first time a report of the Christian Endeavor Union to the Yearly Meeting. In this first report we note that "the executive committee was instructed to publish again the Christian Endeavor News." They also decided to hold their meetings of "the Union on Second Day evening and Third Day morning at the opening of Yearly Meeting." They chose Susan E. Allen as their Christian Endeavor Union evangelist who was to give her time entirely among the societies of Iowa Yearly Meeting. They promised to pay her \$400 and travelling expenses for the year. The Union also pledged \$500 to the Jamaican work, \$100 more than the previous year.

At the 1892 meeting they took a collection of \$109.55 of which \$90 was given for a new horse and the balance on a printing press, both for Gilbert Farr. Seven Quarterly Meetings reported 62 Christian Endeavor Societies with 1,430 active members and 240 associate members for the year 1893. They were continuing to keep an evangelist in the field and pledged support of \$500 for Gilbert Farr in Jamaica. During the early part of the 1900's the Union had reached the point of contributing nearly \$1,000 to foreign missions each year. Most of this amount went to the Jamaica work. It was the peak era in lowa Yearly Meeting.

In 1940 a request was made to change the name from the Christian Endeavor Union to The Young Friends Board. It was approved and succeeding Yearly Meeting Minutes have used this terminology.

1947 was a red letter year for youth in Iowa Yearly Meeting. They entered into another Jamaica project. The Yearly Meeting started putting the Young Friends Board in the budget. The camp site was being developed at Pine Lake which became Camp Quaker Heights. Two leadership training conferences were held.

In 1950 the first Young Friends Camp was held at Quaker Heights.

128 young people appeared (75 had been expected) to stretch the make shift accommodations into near emergency. The dining hall was used to house the girls while the boys slept in tents. Assemblies were held in a 30' x 60' tent. It was the beginning, however, of a fast developing camping program for lowa Young Friends.

In 1952 three camps were held with 147 in attendance. In 1954 there were 187 campers and in 1957 a total of 327. Four camps were conducted in 1958 with 383 followed in 1959 by five camps and 470 cambers plus 65 adult leaders. Camps have successfully continued just under the 500 mark since that time.

In recent years the Young Friends have been paying fifty cent dues and contributing toward a Quaker Heights project and a mission project. In 1962 the mission project involved helping send Eugene and Frances Wolfley to Jamaica for six weeks. The 1963 project was sponsored jointly with the mission committee. Dennis Devick of Marshalltown and Faith Shugart of Greenville were send to Jamaica for six weeks.

The present Quaker Heights project is the construction of a guest cottage which is to be dedicated in memory of Leonard Kimani, a young African student who lost his life in a swimming accident in 1962.

The following projects are developed yearly by the Young Friends Board:

- 1. A yearly program outline to be used by all groups.
- 2. A camping program at Camp Quakers Heights.
- 3. Two College-age retreats.
- 4. A spring leadership conference for high school students and Young Friends sponsors.
- 5. A yearly meeting banquet and program.
- 6. Sponsoring of a fall seminar to United Nations and a spring seminar to Washington, D.C.
- 7. Publishing of a Young Friends newsletter quarterly and bulletin for advisers in the other months.
- Mission project.

A 150th Spiritual Trails Book will be published this summer which will contain the works of the 100th & 125th Spiritual Trail publications.
