The World Café Update

V.I.U. (Very important update). In this article I would like to bring everyone up to speed on the World Café event we held during the Yearly Meeting sessions of 2014. We met on Thursday and Friday afternoon with Dr. Adrian Halverstadt leading us through our discussion questions. As all can see from our photo's we had a wonderful turnout. Ninety plus were involved both days, this was a dream come true for me and frankly I was astounded that we didn't have a big drop off the second session. The three questions that we all wrestled with on day two were: (1) What are the key challenges to unity in IAYM? (2) What does IAYM need to do in order to be relevant in today's society? (3) What places does the Holy Spirit have in IAYM at this time? Both days we had newsprint on each of the 18 tables for people to iot down their ideas. We then asked each table to review and seek a theme which was written on 5X7 post it notes, read to the entire assembly and then posted in groups on the walls.

Following the end of the Yearly Meeting a few weeks later, I asked for a small group to come, gather to-

gether the post-it-notes and seek definitive summary questions for everyone in IAYM to think about and discuss locally. It is my desire to urge each church to review these final questions in each of our monthly meetings and discern how that helps or defines their present condition and understanding. My ultimate hope is that we can have some reporting back to all of us as we gather for the Spring Body of Representatives which is to be held it Fairfield Friends on March 21. Here are the questions as reached on August 27th in my called meeting for assistance:



- 1) Where is our identity found?
- 2) What is the matter at hand?

3) What are our top 5 core values? (core = meaning unwilling to compromise)

It is my hope that each monthly meeting gives time to considering these questions. When and if this opportunity is afforded to each member it should begin with an extended time of inner reflection and personal response to the three questions (or queries), then an open discussion should be held as to how this applies to our individual churches. (All should note that the group who prayerfully considered these questions on the 27th of August, with the exception of me, was under the age of 40). We are aware that today, considerable conviction is held by this age group, which is necessary to be real and authentic in our faith walk.

Iowa Yearly Meeting Missions Board Announces

Fall Thank Offering

The Iowa Yearly Meeting Missions Board enthusiastically invites the churches of Iowa Yearly Meeting to plan a special Thank Offering for the support of the Turkana/Samburu ministries in northern Kenya during the month of November. In these remote areas, God is at work.

Sammy LeToole whom many of us met at yearly meeting has been serving as the director of the Samburu mission for about one year. During this time five new churches have been planted. Sammy has been used by God as a peacemaker in a place called Baragoi where both the Samburu and Turkana people live. Unfortunately, they have been fighting over cattle, sheep, goats and camels. Many people have lost their lives in these conflicts. Sammy struggled to find transportation to this place because public transportation is not available and no one, knowing the conflict that exists there, wanted to risk his life to take him there. Eventually a driver agreed to go. Upon arrival, Sammy found a group of people trying to protect themselves outside the attack. A man provided him with a chair in the midst of this group who then surrounded him. He told them that one part of the work that Quakers do all over the world is to bring peace between the communities and the world. He told them, "Today God sent me to bring peace between the Turkana and Sam-


buru people since you had been fighting for a long time. So this is the time you need to come together and live like brothers and sisters since all of us belong to God our creator and protector." After listening to him for about an hour, one of the men stood and said. "Surely this is what we have been looking for...we are tired of losing young, innocent lives...Man of God, welcome to this place!" They gave Sammy their blessing to meet with them and help them resolve their differences.

In addition to these things, they have launched a satellite campus of Friends Theological College (FTC) so that pastors, evangelists and meeting leaders can receive basic biblical and theological training.

In Turkana, John and Grace Moru still feel called to South Sudan though their travels there have been curtailed because of violence. John continues to prepare himself for greater ministry as he studies Counseling Psychology. Two USFW groups in Turkana have recently received Right Sharing of the World's Resources (RSWR) grants which will enable them to be more self supporting.



A monthly grant from FUM provides for administrative overhead and program costs plus payroll for 25 people in Tur-

Value of Human Life

Our focus for the Peace and Christian Social Concerns Board this past year has been the value of all human life. This stems from the Quaker Belief that there is that of God in all of us. Sounds easy enough, right? I know I like to think that I always "value" everyone that I meet. Do you?

The Bible store that came to mind for me in thinking about the value of human life comes from 1 Kings 3:16-28. The story of the two prostitutes claiming that the baby was their own and the method that King Solomon used to determine who was the real mother of the baby. Wow! What a story! I remember my mother reading this story to me. My mother was an awesome example of what it meant to be a mother. That's why as a child, I hard time believing that any woman would ever be able to agree to having a baby cut in half. But then I grew up. This store could go in the obvious direction, but...

I am choosing a different direction. I pose a question to us all. How often do we "cut children/people in half" so it is fair? How many people are in your community or on your street or in your church that just want someone to value them and see "that of God in us all." Are we, or should I say am I, doing all that we/I can to see God in everyone that we/I encounter?

Everyday God gives me opportunities to encourage, support, guide, and love those who just want to be valued. How often do I miss the opportunity? God forgive me for those missed opportunities. How would my life and my church look different if I truly valued all human life?

I end with this familiar passage from **Matthew 25:35-40**. For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.

Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothing and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?

The King will reply, " tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."


Friday, September 26, 2014




