God's Glory ... by Tom Showalter, General Superintendent

The Book of Exodus concludes with this fabulous passage:

Then the cloud covered the tent of meeting, and the glory of the Lord filled the tabernacle. Moses could not enter the tent of meeting because the cloud had settled on it, and the glory of the Lord filled the tabernacle (Exodus 40:34-35, NIV).

God showed up and His Glory filled the tabernacle. He was there in a tangible way.

The desire for most of us is to see God's Glory in our setting and within our view-point. Before we can have God's Glory show up, however, there is a need to look at the previous thirty-three verses of Exodus 40. God gave Moses instructions as to how the tabernacle should be arranged and set up (vv. 1-15). Exodus 40:16,



"Moses did everything just as the Lord commanded him."

Exodus 40: 17-33 gives account of Moses implementing God's instructions. Verse 33 concludes, "And so Moses finished the work."

Following the preparation and effort, came the fruit of the labors (as stated in 34-35 above). There is no fruit without effort. There is no Glory without preparation.

Are we preparing for God's Glory to fill our lives, our families, our meetings, and our communities?

What preparations need to be taken to get ready for the Glory of God to "fill the tabernacle"?

Jim & Donna Hoeksema Mission Work at FTC—Kenya

We want to thank everyone in Iowa Yearly Meeting who contributed to the Thanksgiving offering that went to help fund the Friends Theological College solar electric project in Kaimosi, Kenya. The money finally arrived here in Kenya the first week of April. We are excited to have enough money to start the project. If you are interested in seeing how the work progresses, we have a blog that we try to update every few days.

We hope to have the system functional by the end of May. That will give us about a month to make sure everything is working well before we return to lowa.

We had a convocation this afternoon and the speaker was using a PowerPoint presentation when the electricity went off at about 3:30. It did not come back on until 8:30. The power goes off nearly every day for several hours. Once the solar electric project is finished, FTC should have electricity 24/7.

The FTC library is blessed to have a trained Kenyan librarian. I've assisted in the daunting task as new books arrive to get call numbers and changes in some of the older cataloging is needed. I've been able to train work study students in some new library skills such as labeling our books and will be covering book

repair techniques with a few. I've completed about 45 major repairs with many more ahead for the future months, adding many more years of service to these materials. Other tasks have been tackled, but also we are excited to see the new computer lab taking shape. There should be around 14 laptops available for students to do research and prepare papers on. The lab will be open all hours the library is open but locked all other times. This involved a

new wood/metal grid dividing wall and new electrical work. Between the laptops and LED lights the college's usage of electricity will be greatly reduced.

20

20 computers were purchased in lowa and carried to Kenya for use at FTC. Most of those will go in the library. Today we installed the first one with a cable attached to keep it in place.



As we prepare for building the solar panel structure, Jim asked a local carpenter to make some saw horses. As it turns out, nobody here has ever seen or heard of a saw horse. It took a lot of explanation and sketches, but the end product turned out quite well.



We set our first pole today (April 25). We cut young eucalyptus trees in the forest and tied them to the post with strips of old tires to hold the post vertical. The hole is 18" in diameter and is 5 feet from bottom of hole to top of black plastic tube. It took a lot longer to mix the concrete and fill the hole than expected. We started setting the pole at 8:30 and finished filling the hole around 3:00, just before the rain came.



We are building a computer lab in one end of the library which will have laptops. The current window bars were spaced far enough apart that the laptops would fit through them, so we hired a welder to add more bars. This is what it looked like when he was done.

May, June and July will be spent doing some surfing, couch surfing that is, as they have to make ready to leave. Robert and Sarah will spend the next two weeks packing for Cambodia. They have to sell or store all of their belongings as they can only take a few items with them. August will be spent at Missionaries In Training Institute, which is a required training for them.

The Bottom Line

Sarah and Robert need to raise \$3000.00 a month for their support in Cambodia. They have managed to raise 25% of the funds per month, but still need pledges totaling \$2000. Simply put, if 20 people would pledge \$100. a month, or if 40 of us would pledge \$50. a month, Sarah and Robert could rest assured that God has worked things out for them to go. For many of us this is one dining out meal a month.

The USFWI/QMI Triennial Conference being held at the Marriott Hotel in Cedar Rapids, IA, July 7-10, 2016, will offer some informative workshops.

Field Staff Updates

Dale Graves, interim Belize Ministry Director, and Lon Fendall, Academic Consultant at Friends Theological College, will bring updates on the expanded Belize ministry and happenings at FTC (solar panels, facility upgrades, satellite campuses, community outreach, and more).

Joyce Ajlouny, Director of Ramallah Friends Schools, and Dana Oswald, William Penn University professor and co-writer of the Kenya Peace Curriculum, will share how educational institutions are teaching the values of peace and equality in countries that have experienced and are experiencing hatred and violence. Joyce will give updates on RFS, and Dana will share about her recent trip to Kenya to consult with Kenyan teachers and administrators about the implementation of the Peace Curriculum.

Joy in Quaker Grey

Joy Conwell, Historical Collections/Circulation Associate at Iowa Wesleyan University in Mount Pleasant, Iowa, will present a "Quaker Fashion Show", sharing historical insights into typical Quaker clothing worn during the westward migration of Quakers in the US.

A Crown of Beauty Instead of Ashes

21st century slavery is one of the most pernicious and disturbing issues of our time, needing awareness, attention, and action from Christians world-wide. This workshop will be led by a panel of Iowans who are involved in ministry to victims of human trafficking. They will share stories and current information to help us become better informed and to offer practical suggestions for addressing this multi-million dollar business.

When the Going Gets Tough – Attitudes for Finding Joy

This workshop, led by Mary Glenn Hadley and Kathy Luethje, will provide insights for helping us rise above difficult times, letting the voice of scripture offer guidance. "Though pain and suffering eventually visits everyone, how we react to it determines where it will take us. . . . We will experience together how we can walk with each other through dark times."

These Triennial Conference workshops will be offered Sat. afternoon, July 9: 1:30-3:00 and 4:00-5:30. The 2nd session is a repeat of the 1st session.



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
