God's Leading by Tom Showalter, General Superintendent

Iowa Yearly Meeting sessions are approaching and I look forward to seeing how God will choose to lead as we gather. Our goal is to discern God's plan for His people and His Body. To hear and discern God's voice requires preparation that precedes the gathering.

"Discernment is an ever-increasing capacity to 'see' or discern the works of God in the midst of the human situation so that we can align ourselves with whatever it is that God is doing. Every Christian is called to this kind of discernment (Rom. 12:2)" (Barton, 2012). When the Body of Christ is gathered, seeking His plan and not our own is paramount to unity in the community.

Paul Anderson, professor of Quaker studies at George Fox University, boldly proclaims:

"One great need of the church today is to experience the dynamic leadership of Christ as its Head...The Scriptures promise us that Christ's Spirit will be with us, will guide us, and will lead us into all truth...If Christ desires to lead His church, His will should be sought. If His will can be sought, it can be discerned; and if it can be discerned, it deserves to be obeyed. This is nothing more than the *basic Christian life*" (Barton, 2012)

In the midst of seeking God's will is the expectation that once His plan is recognized, His plan will be pursued. With that in mind, I would encourage you to prepare for Yearly Meeting. Not only do registrations need to be completed and travel arrangements made, but spiritual preparations are needed as well to hear God speak. If you are unable to attend our gathering this year, commit to pray for those who do attend.

"1Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship. 2Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. **Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will**." (Romans 12: 1-2).

Help for Refugees in Crisis written by Hannah Maselli

James 1:27 (NLT) Pure and genuine religion in the sight of God the Father means caring for orphans and widows in their distress and refusing to let the world corrupt you.

James 2:14-16 (NLT) What good is it, dear brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but don't show it by your actions? Can that kind of faith save anyone? Suppose you see a brother or sister who has no food or clothing, and you say, "Goodbye and have a good day; stay warm and eat well"—but then you don't give that person any food or clothing. What good does that do?

Tragedy strikes day and night around the world. We wake up to another news story of loss and suffering every morning. Yet, we are so far removed from those who suffer. We send them our condolences momentarily and forget them just in time for the next story of tragedy to come across our social media feeds.

There is one crisis that has been present for a while now. This is the fighting in Syria. Daily, people are dying; losing their homes, children, and family; and fleeing for their lives. Sometimes they escape only to be met with hostility or attempt to brave deadly waters. Sometimes they succeed, and sometimes they perish seeking a chance to survive.

According to the United Nations office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, 13.5 million people have been forced out of their home due to the ongoing civil war in Syria, which now represents the largest displacement crisis in the world, with over half the population forced out of their homes. Nearly half of the people affected by this conflict are children, 5.6 million children.

As of June 2, 2016, there were 4,843,344 Syrian people affected by the refugee crisis seeking aid through Europe. Over half of that number is made up of women and children. Between April 2011 and March 2016, there were 1,004,345 asylum applications in Europe. According to The UN Refugee Agency, "the number of Syrians arriving in Europe seeking international protection continues to increase. However, it remains low compared to Syria's neighboring countries, with slightly more than 10 percent of those who have fled the conflict seeking safety in Europe."

According to State Department data, 67 percent of refugees referred to the U.S. by the U.N. have been women and children under the age of 12. By law, the United States administration is only allowed to admit slightly more than 10,000 refugees in the 2016 fiscal year. No refugee commitments can be made beyond that. In total, 2,290 Syrian refugees have arrived in the United States since fiscal year 2011, which was when the Syrian civil war began. Of that number, only 62 have identified themselves as Christian. That is 2.7 percent.

As of February 7, 2016, one source put the death toll of the Syrian civil war at 210,060 people. Nearly half of those people were civilians. Many suggest the death toll is much higher because accurate data is very hard to receive as the conflict continues and worsens. There is a climate of destitution, depravity, and devastation being created in our world. It is taking the lives of literally countless human beings.

We can draw three conclusions from all of this data: 1) there is a very prevalent and obvious need for aid among the Syrian population; 2) there is a specific group of people coming into the United States who have experienced horrors who have not received the Gospel message; and 3) there are many, many people created by God who are displaced, hungry, lost, and scared who need far more aid than is currently being provided. Refer to the Scriptures above. We have been commanded to provide for those who need the loving provision of our Lord Jesus Christ. There are more than lives on the line; there are souls waiting to have their eternity determined. Christian Aid Mission, a non-profit organization that assists over 500 ministries across the globe, said "that the ongoing conflict that is tearing apart Syria and creating millions of refugees and displaced people is an opportunity for Christians to who the love of Christ, which is opening the world's eyes" (Christian Post)

There are countless charities that provide aid to those affected by the Syrian tragedy. There is a pressing need for more aid because these refugees depend on humanitarian sources for food, clothing, shelter, medical assistance, and schooling for children. Here is a website that helps you find a charity that provides for the needs of the Syrian people in a way of your choosing.
