Iowa Yearly Meeting of Friends

Focus on Purpose

Five hundred years ago this Tuesday, the Protestant Reformation took place. (Oct. 31, 1517). At the heart of this transformation of the Church were questions about authority, salvation, and practices. As a **much** abbreviated summary, the outcomes were "Five Solas": 1) Sola Scriptura (Scripture Alone). The Bible alone is the sole authority for all matters of faith and practice; 2) Sola Gratia (Salvation by Grace Alone). God's blessing in Christ is the sole efficient cause of salvation; 3) Sola Fide (Salvation by Faith Alone). We are justified by faith in Christ alone, not by the works of the Law; 4) Solus Christus (In Christ Alone). Salvation is found in Christ alone. No one and nothing else can save; and 5) Solio Deo Gloria (For the Glory of God Alone). Salvation is of God and has been accomplished by God for His glory alone. The article concluded:

"These five important doctrines are the reason for the Protestant Reformation. They are at the heart of the Reformers' call for the church to return to biblical teaching. The Five Solas are just as important today in evaluating a church and its teachings as they were in the sixteenth century." (What was the Protestant Reformation?)

Fast forward to 2015. IAYM Ministry Conference participated in a World Cafe' where three questions were asked and participants were given opportunity to share, discuss, and debate these questions: 1) What key elements (core values) will carry our yearly meeting through the next decade? 2) What are the most crucial needs of Iowa Yearly Meeting churches in order to carry out the key elements through the next decade and beyond? 3) If you were king for a day, how would you address the crucial needs of Iowa Yearly Meeting churches during the next decade

In an attempt to analyze these answers, I have found that so many of the responses showed a strong desire for traditional Judeo-Christian, biblical, pursuits.

Following that annual gathering in October 2015, I began my work in IAYM. I strongly advocate for any organization to know its reason for existence, its mission, purpose, and the vision it is pursuing. Recently I shared with someone that we need to focus on our purpose and pursue it passionately. It is going to take time, but I believe we must take the time to formulate our mission statement and core values. Tony Dungy wrote, "The vision, mission, and values we establish in life are the guiding lights for our lives and the lives of those we lead. Those three elements create the 'goalposts' for the decisions and actions of our lives. They should direct and guide everything we do—and we should develop them prayerfully as we move forward."

As often cited, while the American population continues to increase, the statistics of church attendance continues to decline. If we can recapture a vision for disciple making and restoration of the purpose of the Church, we can look at the future with hope, not despair. Consider this lighthearted analogy of Sam and Jed who saw the potential and not the threat:

An organization in Montana offered a bounty of five thousand dollars for every wolf captured alive. Two hunters named Sam and Jed decided to head for the hills and make some money capturing wolves. Day and night they scoured the mountains and forests searching for their valuable prey. Exhausted after three days of hunting without any success, they both fell asleep.

During the night, Sam suddenly woke up to find that he and Jed were surrounded by a pack of thirty wolves, with flaming red eyes and bared teeth.

Sam nudged Jed and said, "Hey, wake up! We're gonna be rich!"

Finally, I have visited 32 of our 33 churches for morning worship. I have completed two years of service in IAYM, and have had countless conversations; I have seen strong commitments to biblical values, hearts focused on Christ, and the desire to see more people brought into God's Kingdom. Like the Reformation, I wonder if we are on the verge of seeing another reformation or revival in The Church. As I recently stated in the Iowa Friend, we need to focus on the mission/purpose of The Church, we need to understand that we are God's Ambassadors, we need to analyze our methods and evaluate them by the fruit produced, and we need to be a people of prayer.

As we continue to prayerfully formulate a mission statement, may our focus be to continually pursue God's Agenda. May nothing distract us from that. As I shared with the pastors' at retreat, Nehemiah responded to many attempts to distract him from the work, "I am doing a great work and I cannot come down. I do not want the work to stop while I leave to meet you" (Nehemiah 6:3). Later, Nehemiah prays, "God make me strong" (Nehemiah 6:9).

May we know our mission as Nehemiah did. May we not allow anything to distract us from pursuing it passionately. May we submit our ways to His ways. May we pursue God's Agenda, not our own.

- 3.A candidate from the Yearly Meeting shall have successfully completed secondary education requirements and shall have been accepted by William Penn University.
- 4. Applications must be received by **January 31st, 2018**
- 5.To be considered for a scholarship for the succeeding academic year, recipients must submit a request to the committee each year.
- 6. Scholarships shall only be awarded for a maximum of four (4) academic years.
