Challenge for the New Year

Global warming is either true or it is false. Understand that my opinion on the topic is irrelevant. Either it is factual or not. Often both sides of the debate use "proof" to support their particular perspective and ignore any evidence that disagrees. (**Disclaimer: please do not send me emails, letters, or other communications proving your claims to be true** © I merely seek to make a greater point).

The same can be said regarding evolution and a myriad of other debated topics. The point, however, is to illustrate that opinion is irrelevant and the actualities are the essence.

Proverbs 14:12, "There is a way that appears to be right, but in the end it leads to death." In other words, appearances can be deceiving and our ways can appear good, right, or worth pursuing, but the end result is not something worth pursuing. Who determines "right"? In Right from Wrong (Word, 1994, p. 17), Josh McDowell describes absolute truth as "that which is true for all people, for all times, for all places. Absolute truth is truth that is objective, universal, and constant."

When it comes to the standard by which to measure our path, let's examine these three aspects further: Objective, Constant, and Universal.

Objective: A true standard of right and wrong must be objective; that is, it must exist independently of what you or any other person thinks or feels. Otherwise, right and wrong could change from person-to -person. Your conscience is not an objective standard of right and wrong, because it does not exist independently of you, your opinions, and your feelings.

Constant: A true standard of right and wrong must be constant; that is, it must apply to all people in all places. If it did not, right and wrong may change from culture-to-culture or even from community-to-community.

Universal: A true standard of right and wrong must be universal; that is, it must be un-changing. It does not change with time. Otherwise, right and wrong might be different from generation-to-generation, or even from day-to-day. In the absence of a constant standard of right and wrong, you have no hope of knowing, from one minute to the next, whether an act is right or wrong (based upon McDowell's Right from Wrong book).

Who we are, what we believe, and the path we pursue is of utmost importance. As we enter 2018, may we continue to pursue truth for the important pursuits of Iowa Yearly Meeting. We cannot merely uphold tradition if there is not a purpose for doing so. We must seek the absolutes and pursue God's agenda as we move

forward.

2018 Challenges For a New Year

As I read the Discipline, I find it crucial to challenge IAYM with these thoughts:

- 1) If you have not done so or have not in quite a while, read The Discipline (in addition to your Bibles, of course). Familiarize yourself with the operation of the local church and the Yearly Meeting. (The Discipline can be found on our website iaym.org under the "About Us" tab)
- 2) Pastors, keep in mind, the contract year is July 1 to June 30. Changes made outside that time frame make it more challenging to find another pastor to fill the vacant role.
- 3) Participation at Yearly Meeting sessions at the end of July is crucial. It is essential that your meeting sends delegates. 4.Applications must be received by January 31st, 2018

- 5.To be considered for a scholarship for the succeeding academic year, recipients must submit a request to the committee each year.
- 6.Scholarships shall only be awarded for a maximum of four (4) academic years.

He attended Winter Park High School and participated in track and football. He currently has the most point scored in track in school history. In football, he was awarded a full athletic scholarship to Iowa State University. At Iowa State, RJ was introduced to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, where he got saved on October 5, 2007. RJ came on staff with FCA in September, 2014. He serves coaches and athletes in the Des Moines inner-city schools: Hoover, Lincoln, Roosevelt, North and East.
