Recalling Personal Highlights of Service

At the end of one's term of service, there is often a time of recalling memories. We see that at the end of a calendar year, for example, or when a change of leadership takes place. As I approach the end of my service in Iowa Yearly Meeting, I would like to look back at some of, what I believe, are important "highlights" from the reports to the Body of IAYM and what I would consider personal highlights of the work done since 2015:

I want all pastors and participants in IAYM to know that I am here to serve Jesus Christ and to serve the local meetings to become healthy and mission-al-minded extensions of the Body of Christ. This happens as we establish healthy relationships within the Yearly Meeting, within our local meetings, and within our communities. There are needs all around us and I pray that we would see these needs, make connections, and meet the needs of those around us as we become "light in dark places." (July 2016).

As I observe the current condition of Friends nationwide, I see a lot of transition taking place. Some yearly meetings are splitting, some are reorganizing, some are going through leadership transitions, and others are making evaluations. In my last report to BOC, I declared the importance of knowing our foundation, our associations, and our direction. We cannot be deterred because the ramifications may be too difficult or the potential repercussions too great. We serve a great God who deserves our pursuit of holiness. We can trust Him to lead and guide us as we seek Him for wisdom, discernment, and clarity of our call. (March 2017)

At the recent Triennial, many of the General Board members reported that their yearly meetings are refining their Faith & Practice or Disciplines. There is a "stirring" among Friends to examine their beliefs and practices. As a relative newcomer to IAYM and as I consider what we believe, with whom we associate, and what will be our direction...If Iowa Yearly Meeting of Friends Churches can revive the mission of the church to make disciples, we will see unprecedented progress. How can I say this? This mission has been endorsed and handed to us by none other than the Head of the Church, Jesus Christ. When we obediently follow His plan for His church, we can trust we will see His hand at work in our midst. (July 2017)

I strongly advocate for any organization to know its reason for existence, its mission, purpose, and the vision it is pursuing. In Mission Drift, the authors state, "Knowing who you are is the first line of defense against drifting away from your purpose; it allows you to determine if change and adjustments are equipping you to better accomplish your mission or slowly moving you away from your foundation." In spite of the challenges of this past year (one of which was not being able to meet regularly in person) Mac and Berny have been working to stay connected with the youth who have been a part of their program. They have been delivering lessons, crafts and snacks to the youth and are hopeful that they will have 6 to 8 young people who may be interested in attending Camp Quaker Heights this year.



Mac shared that the camp experience for our Meskwaki friends is a large act of bravery. They seem to be content keeping amongst themselves within their community. Going to camp is truly stepping out of their comfort zone but when they attend, lives are changed. By providing the funds for them to attend camp, we can help them

move out of their comfort zone and build their self-confidence as they interact with others and grow deeper in their relationship with God.

Wouldn't it be wonderful to provide the opportunity for Mesquakie Friends youth with a chance to experience the love and grace of God in a new way? Imagine how their lives might be changed as the learn of the promises found in Joshua 1:9 --that might help them understand that the Lord God is with them wherever they go. That they can be strong and courageous because of God's promise to never leave them. Perhaps they might come to know that nothing can separate them from God's love. (Romans 8:38-39) How awesome would that be?

Those are just two of the many promises that they can learn about at camp as they are surrounded by people who love Jesus.

Prayerfully consider this opportunity to send our Mesquakie youth to camp. Cost per camper is \$240 for Middle School students and \$300.00 for High School students.

The mission statement being submitted for approval through the M&C Board is: 'The Body of IAYM exists to exalt Jesus Christ by becoming fruitful disciple-makers and expressing God's love by serving all people (John 15:1-17).' In the book Mission Drift, the authors state, "It is the responsibility of leaders to remain faithful in safeguarding the mission of their organizations" (Mission Drift, p.64). As I approach three years in this position in IAYM, my message has been that we must know who we are, what we believe, and with whom we associate. Then our destination will be much clearer. (July 2018)

Our mission states: "The Body of IAYM exists to exalt Jesus Christ by becoming fruitful disciple-makers and expressing God's love by serving all people (John 15:1-17). We have God's Word, our Discipline, our great Quaker heritage, and a recently adopted mission statement. Our task is to measure all we do by these objective standards. (July 2019)

2020 was a difficult year for everyone, but the difficulty for our family began in 2019 when my father died, my daughter, Grace, was diagnosed with an auto-immune illness, and by year's end, I had been diagnosed with atrial fibrillation.
